An estimated 70% of adults in the US have experienced some type of traumatic event in his/her life and many times these traumatic events occur in childhood. According to the CDC, *“Childhood experiences, both positive and negative, have a tremendous impact on future violence victimization and perpetration, and lifelong health and opportunity. As such, early experiences are an important public health issue”*. Speaker Information:

Dr. Asha Dickerson is an Atlanta-based educator of counselors, social workers, human service professionals, addictions specialists, and other helping professionals. She is a National Certified Counselor, Licensed Professional Counselor, and Certified Professional Counselor Supervisor. Dr. Dickerson is a native of Montgomery, Alabama and alumna of the University of Alabama at Birmingham having graduated with bachelor's degrees in Psychology and History and a master's degree in Community/Agency Counseling. She received a doctoral degree from Auburn University.

Dr. Dickerson began her professional career working for the Alabama Department of Human Resources Child Protective Services (CPS) Division. Through reuniting families, assisting with redefining families for Alabama's foster children, and seeing the benefits of family counseling, she decided to pursue a degree in Counseling. She recognized that the majority of CPS cases were due, in some form, to substance use, and wanted to work specifically with these families. After completing internships in a methadone clinic and family counseling agency, she was invited to join the clinical staff at Fellowship House Inc., a private, non-profit, substance abuse recovery program designed to serve the special needs of individuals who suffer from alcoholism and/or drug addiction and co-occurring disorders. As a clinician, Dr. Dickerson built the Family Program and served as the Family and Community Service Coordinator for Fellowship House, Inc. While in this position she created and expanded multiple programs, secured private funding, and enriched the lives of numerous individuals who have family members suffering with substance addiction.
